This is the last foreseeable letter being sent to Child Support Enforcement (Duval County); copies are also being sent to St. Johns County Probation and the Public Defender, the 7th District Attorney (FL), and Calhoun County (AL) Probation.

A discrepancy exists between the verdict for Case #P108-53 and three independent criminal background reports; the verdict was “not-guilty” and the reports show “guilty” or “convicted”. In reply to the discrepancy, the St. Johns County Public Defender has advised me to “contact the company for the inaccuracy”.

The offered advice is not possible – though it has been tried on two occasions. The policies of these reporting agencies do not offer a defendant a “procedure for correcting the data”; moreover, the process – if it were possible – would involve the present and all anticipated reporting agencies. Correcting the status must come through the originator via the processes of St. Johns County and its system...

To summarize the events leading to my unemployment, past and present:

- On May 28, 2008, I was arrested at my workplace
- In September 2008, I lost my job due my detainment in jail/absence from my workplace.
- On September 25, 2008, I agreed to a plea bargain of “withhold a finding of guilt” only to discover that my criminal background status is “guilty” or “convicted”.
- For nine months I have been unable to find re-employment (though having lost five opportunities because of status of the criminal background and/or the implications as interpreted through dialogue)

There is nothing I can do to rectify this problem; and until the status is corrected by the originating organization, my employment opportunity – present and future – will remain very limited. Perhaps the Child Enforcement Agency can work with St. Johns County to rectify the problem and enable me to return to my profession of which I have presently lost. Such an effort and accomplishment would be in the best interest of my children.
